**Biographical/Historical Note:** Charleston, S.C. trade union. The Bricklayers, Stone Masons, Plasterers, Marble Masons, Tile Layers, Terrazzo Workers and Cement Finishers was a subordinate union of the Bricklayers, Masons and Plasterers International Union of America, which in 1975 changed its name to the International Union of Bricklayers and Allied Craftsmen.

**Scope and content:** Records consist of correspondence, financial records, and pamphlets.

Correspondence (1954-1955) concerns financial affairs; death benefits due to the children of Eugene A. Dollard (d. 1954), a union member; and other matters.

Financial records consist of six receipt stub books (1951-1955) recording payments for initiations, working privileges, dues, and other expenses of individual members. Pamphlets include the "Constitution, By-Laws, Working Code and Rules of Order of the Bricklayers, Masons, Plasterers, Marble Masons, Tile Layers, Terrazzo Workers and Cement Finishers' Unions No. 1 and 10" (n.d.); "Working Code" (1950); and "Constitution and By-Laws of Unions No. 1 and 10 B.M. & P.I.U. of A." (1953)
