

# Schirmer family journals and registers, 1806-1929 SCHS 1149.00 Microfilm 45/205-207 Containers 11/567-568

**Creator:** Schirmer family.

**Description:** 1 linear ft.

**Biographical/historical note: Prominent** Charleston, S.C. family of German descent. Jacob F. Schirmer owned a Charleston cooperage business and was president of the corporation of St. John's Lutheran Church from 1855 to 1869. He was active in the state Evangelical Lutheran Synod, often serving as a representative in the General Synods, and was treasurer of the German Friendly Society. For many years he kept a registry of marriages and deaths as well as personal journals which provide a remarkable record of daily life in Charleston. After his death in October 1880 his son Jacob S. Schirmer (1831-1890) continued keeping similar records until 1886.

**Scope and content:** Volumes chiefly consist of journals and vital registers. Included are death registers (1806-1880) kept by Edward G. Sass and others.

Five journals (or diaries, 1826-1880) of Jacob F. Schirmer contain personal entries as well as records of births, deaths, marriages, and events mainly in Charleston (S.C.) including fires, militia activities, elections, trials, property transactions, crimes, yellow fever outbreaks, shipwrecks, and affairs of the Lutheran church and other denominations. A register (1826-1866) contains alphabetically arranged entries about marriages, births, deaths, and daily events. The first journal (1826-1846) begins in October 1826 and includes daily entries on marriages, births, deaths, weather, and events. After 1830 the journals include more personal entries, remarking on church affairs, family matters, personal faith, politics, events of the Civil War, and postwar conditions in South Carolina. Another volume (1826-1929; ask for 45/206) contains alphabetically arranged marriage and death records (1826-1880); a section entitled "Our Domestic Trials with Freedmen and Others" (1865-1880) recounting Schirmer's interesting difficulties with black and white house servants; and genealogical information (with additions by other family members) on the Schirmer, Sass, and related families.

Journal (1880-1886) continued by Jacob S. Schirmer contains daily entries on marriages, deaths, and events. Two additional volumes (1881-1886) contain alphabetically arranged marriage and death registers.

Other items include an index (1826-1880) of women's names found in J.F. Schirmer's records; "A Record of Various Travels Made Since 1835" (1829-1878) about Jacob F. Schirmer's trips for social visits and church business (Lutheran synods); calendar of selected world events from ancient times to 1861; and clippings.
